Believe: Remaining & Fruiting

Check in with each other about how everyone is doing.

Bible Reading: John 15:1-8 (9-17)

Sermon Summary:

John 15 gives us the vine & branches metaphor where Jesus describes how he & all his disciples, at that time & from then forward, are organically connected to each other. Throughout the metaphor, Jesus' command for all disciples was simple: *"Remain in me!"* This begins when we believe in Jesus. *"Remain in me,"* goes further to mean to continue believing, to stay open to him, & to draw all we need to live for him. As a result, we bear fruit just like a fruit tree does. What is this fruit in the Christian life? Some point to new people coming to faith in Jesus. Others point to the fruit of the Spirit (Gal. 5:22-23). But in the context of John 15, Jesus says disciples are to love one another as he loved us, & that he would lay down his life for us to express his love (vv. 12-13). This means we willingly go

without something for the good of others. This sacrificial love is what Jesus displayed & now he calls us, in union with him, to display it to others.

Discussion:

- 1. What fruit did God expect from Israel (the OT vine)? See Isa. 5:1-7, Mic. 6:8. We should not be surprised that Jesus expects fruit from us.
- 2. What's the main thought about us 'remaining' in Jesus, the vine? When does it begin? What does it look like going forward from there?
- 3. In 15:4-5, Jesus makes it clear that unless we remain in him we can't do anything to please God. Which ways are helpful to you to remain connected to Jesus?
- 4. In 15:4, Jesus says, "Remain in me" & then in 15:9 he says, "Remain in my love." True Christians love as Jesus loved. Consider & discuss this quote together: " An apple tree bears apples, a peach tree bears peaches, & a follower of Jesus Christ loves [like Jesus loved]..."
- 5. The vine & branches image gives us a new way to see what a church can look like & how it can function. Read & discuss what Gail O'Day says about this: "The vine metaphor suggests a radically non-hierarchical model for the church. There is neither status nor rank among the branches. No branch has pride of place; no one branch can claim precedence or privilege over any other. Hierarchy among the branches of the vine is precluded, because all members grow out of the one central vine."
- 6. What does sacrificial love look like in your personal life? What impact can 'each one of us loving others as Jesus loved' have on people coming to CIT?
